Saint Peter the Apostle (first century)

Peter, a fisherman, was called by Jesus to be one of his Twelve Apostles. Jesus loved Peter very much, in spite of Peter's denial about knowing him during the Passion. After the Resurrection, Jesus made Peter leader of the Apostles and head of the Church. Peter was later arrested in Rome and put to death.

Scripture Background

In the Time of the Early Church

Eucharist Scripture provides few details about how the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, was celebrated in the first Christian communities (Acts 2:42–47; 20:7; 27:35; 1 Corinthians 10:16; 11:17-34).

From these brief accounts, we sense that the disciples were filled with the joy of the Resurrection and the hope of the Second Coming. Gathering in someone's home for a communal meal, they blessed and thanked God and recalled the events of Jesus' life, death, and Resurrection. By repeating Jesus' words of consecration at the Last Supper, he became present to them in the breaking of the bread.



OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Architecture

Domed Churches In Eastern Christianity the churches are usually topped with domes instead of steeples. These domes are often gilded, expressing the radiance of heaven. One of the most famous of the domed churches is the Cathedral of St. Basil in Moscow, Russia. Building began in the sixteenth century during the reign of Czar Ivan IV. Many colorful, onionshaped domes are covered with intricate patterns. Gold is used heavily in the decoration.

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
