Born in Yugoslavia, Mother Teresa entered the Sisters of Loreto and became a high school teacher in Calcutta, India. In 1948 she felt God calling her to serve the poorest of the poor, and founded the Missionaries of Charity. Today its members serve the poor, sick, and dying around the world. **Feast Day:** September 5

In the Time of the Early Church

The Role of Deacons As the early Church grew in numbers, the Apostles found they were no longer able to see to all the needs of the faithful. Therefore, they asked the disciples to choose several reputable men from the community to assist them. The Apostles ordained those chosen as deacons. The deacons performed services connected to the ritual of the Lord's Supper, such as serving and cleaning up. They also cared for the needs of widows and orphans.

A Witness to the Poor

Dorothy Day was a convert to Catholicism who had a strong sense of the social call of the Gospel. She reached out to the poor and powerless and gave of herself with great dignity. She started Catholic Worker houses across the country, and encouraged people to follow Christ.

One group of people Dorothy ministered to was women prisoners. While she was visiting a West Virginia prison, an elderly inmate wanted to know why Dorothy was there. She replied that she had come to wash their feet. Dorothy Day died in 1980. She was a powerful witness to the Church's mission of serving the poor.
