### Getting Ready for Chapter 6

### Scripture Background

#### In the Time of Jesus

**Water** Water played a vital role in the desert areas of Palestine. Always a symbol of life for humans, animals, and plants, water also served as an element of ritual purification before meals and in actions to effect cures for skin diseases or other ailments. The *Rite* of *Baptism* uses water to "cleanse" the soul of original sin, so that we may be "born of water and Spirit" (John 3:5), likening us to those whom God saved through the Flood.

You can read about Jesus' baptism by John in Mark 1:7–11 and Philip's baptism of the Ethiopian in Acts 8:36–38.

# OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Art

**Baptisteries** Places where people are baptized are called *baptisteries*. In some churches they are very elaborate. Some baptisteries are separate from the church building itself and are richly decorated. One of the oldest baptisteries is in Rome at the Basilica of St. John Lateran. Construction began during the reign of Constantine in the fourth century. One of the most beautiful baptisteries stands opposite the Florence Cathedral in Italy. Legend has it that Michelangelo called its third pair of bronze doors "the Gates of Paradise."
