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Getting Ready for Chapter 19



Scripture Background

In the Time of the Early Church

First Christian Community Peter set up the first Christian community in Jerusalem. Here Christians tried to adhere to the teachings of the Apostles, and center their religious life in the Eucharistic liturgy. Through a system of fair distribution, the wealthy sold their possessions for the needs of the poor. At the time, followers of Jesus continued the practice of Temple worship as Jews.

You can read of the efforts of early Christians in Acts 2:42–47, 4:32–37.

OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Volunteerism

Catholic Network of Volunteer Service In 1963, the non-profit organization of Catholic Network of Volunteer Service (CNVS) was formed. Its goal is to help women and men use their gifts by volunteering service to others. Special programs help connect volunteers with volunteer opportunities. CNVS supports community-based programs such as Americorps, which is the domestic Peace Corps. This volunteer program encourages youth to help other youth with issues involving illiteracy, poverty, crime, homelessness, and environmental problems.
