## In the Time of Jesus

**Shepherd Imagery** Since shepherding was a common occupation in the Holy Land, Jesus used this familiar image to explain certain spiritual truths. One of a shepherd's duties was to count his sheep at night and rescue those that had strayed. In the Parable of the Lost Sheep, the shepherd rejoices when he finds the lost sheep. This illustrates God's love for his people. Jesus, known as the Good Shepherd, called upon the Apostles to continue caring for his flock. Today, bishops, priests, and deacons follow in their tradition.

## OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Matrimony

**The Wedding Ring** Many think that the ancient Egyptians twisted plant fibers to make the first wedding rings. The wedding ring has long been an important part of the Sacrament of Matrimony; it symbolizes a pledge of fidelity and everlasting love. A wedding ring is traditionally worn on the third finger of the left hand. One common belief holds that this tradition dates back to the 17th century where during a wedding the priest arrived at the third finger by touching the thumb and the first two fingers on the left hand as he said, "in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost."
