Before the Time of Jesus

The Prophet Elijah Elijah was the most prominent prophet of his time. He confronted the evil King Ahab and Queen Jezebel when they tried to establish Baal as the god of Israel. Elijah confronted the prophets of Baal at Mount Carmel (1 Kings 18). In spite of his victory at Carmel, Elijah became filled with fear and went to live in a cave at Mount Horeb. God responded to Elijah's distress with compassion, providing him food, and speaking to him in a gentle voice, reassuring him that there were others who were still faithful to the covenant.

OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Religious Life

Maryknoll Sisters Mary Josephine Rogers was interested in foreign missions. Mollie, as Mary was also known, graduated from Smith College in 1905. At Smith her interest in mission work was spurred by Protestant students involved in volunteer work. Mollie later founded the Maryknoll Sisters and was then known as Mother Mary Joseph. Her missionary sisters traveled to remote areas of China to work with the poor and share their faith. When Mother Mary Joseph founded her community, it had only 35 members. By her death in 1955, more than 1,000 Maryknoll sisters were working in 19 countries.
