Scripture Background

In the Time of Jesus

The Beatitudes The word beatitude comes from the Latin word for "blessed"—the word that begins each beatitude (Matthew 5:3–10). The Old Testament also contains many "Blessed are" statements. Although Jesus' declarations followed a traditional form, the beliefs they expressed challenged tradition. According to Old Testament beliefs, blessings, or riches, are given in this lifetime to those who keep God's Law. However, Jesus taught that the authentic reward for living a virtuous life comes after death, in God's Kingdom.
