Sacramentals are sacred signs given to us by the Church. They prepare us to receive the grace of the sacraments. Sacramentals include special prayers such as blessings and sacred objects such as holy water, crucifixes, rosary beads, and blessed palms. They also include sacred actions such as making the Sign of the Cross.

Scripture Background

In the Early Church

The Book of Revelation The Book of Revelation is also known as the Apocalypse, because of its symbolism, imagery, and mystic numbers, used to convey hidden messages to the early Christians. The book is believed to have been written by the apostle John to the early Christian community during a time of persecution. In the book, John reports his visions of the glorified Christ. Revelation has been subject to different interpretations by Christians, but all agree that it makes an unmistakable declaration about the final triumph of God.

OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Sacramentals

The Fisherman's Ring On April 19, 2005, the College of Cardinals elected Joseph Ratzinger as the 264th successor of Saint Peter. Cardinal Ratzinger took the name Pope Benedict XVI, in honor of Saint Benedict of Nursia and Pope Benedict XV. At the Inauguration Mass, Pope Benedict XVI received the Fisherman's Ring, which is made of gold with an image of Saint Peter casting a net. The Pope uses the ring to seal official Church documents. It is a very special sacramental, symbolizing that the Pope is the successor of Saint Peter and the head of the Catholic Church.
