In the Time of Jesus

The Paschal Lamb During the Exodus, Moses commanded each Hebrew family to slaughter a lamb on the evening of the 14th of *Nisan* (March/April) and sprinkle its blood on the doorpost of the home. This slaughtered lamb was called the paschal lamb. On the night of the 14th, every firstborn son in Egypt died, but the Israelite firstborns were saved. Jesus is the new Paschal Lamb (John 1:29; 1 Corinthians 5:7) who, through his death for our sins, saves us not from physical death, but from the eternal death brought about by our sins.
